



1 Progress Board to serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The North Carolina Progress  
2 Board may elect such other officers as it sees fit.

3 (d) The North Carolina Progress Board shall meet at least twice annually on the  
4 call of the chair or as additionally provided by the North Carolina Progress Board. A  
5 quorum is ~~4~~ 12 members of the Board. Members may not send designees to board  
6 meetings, nor may they vote by proxy.

7 (e) Board appointments shall be for terms to begin July 1, 1999, with subsequent  
8 appointments to be made as terms expire or resignations occur. Of the Governor's  
9 appointments, two shall be for one-year terms, two shall be for two-year terms, two  
10 shall be for three-year terms, and two shall be for four-year terms. Of the appointments  
11 made by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the  
12 Senate, and the North Carolina Progress Board, one member appointed by each shall be  
13 appointed for a one-year term, one member appointed by each shall be appointed for a  
14 two-year term, one member appointed by each shall be appointed for a three-year term,  
15 and ~~one two member~~ members appointed by each shall be appointed for a four-year  
16 term. As terms expire, successors shall be appointed for four-year terms.

17 (f) No member may be appointed to more than two consecutive terms. A  
18 member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House vacates  
19 membership on the North Carolina Progress Board when that person is no longer a  
20 member of the House of Representatives, except that if that person is in office at the  
21 expiration of the term of office in the House of Representatives but has not been elected  
22 to the next term, that person shall continue to serve until the convening of the regular  
23 session. A member of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate  
24 vacates membership on the North Carolina Progress Board when that person is no  
25 longer a member of the Senate, except that if that person is in office at the expiration of  
26 the term of office in the Senate but has not been elected to the next term, that person  
27 shall continue to serve until the convening of the regular session."

28 **SECTION 2.** G.S. 143B-372.2 reads as rewritten:

29 "**§ 143B-372.2. Responsibilities.**

30 (a) The General Assembly notes that the Commission for a Competitive North  
31 Carolina developed goals in the following categories:

- 32 (1) Healthy Children and Families;
- 33 (2) Quality Education for All;
- 34 (3) A High Performance Workforce;
- 35 (4) A Prosperous Economy;
- 36 (5) A Sustainable Environment;
- 37 (6) Technology and Infrastructure Development;
- 38 (7) Safe and Vibrant Communities; and
- 39 (8) Active Citizenship/Accountable Government.

40 The Commission for a Competitive North Carolina adopted a report which  
41 established major goals and ways to measure progress toward these goals.

42 (a1) The General Assembly finds that the North Carolina Progress Board  
43 developed a report that focused on four of the Commission's recommended topics and  
44 issued 16 major targets for 2010. The objectives of the targets are to drive the State

1 toward (i) a more expansive vision of education and environmental protection, (ii)  
2 strengthening families, and (iii) bringing more people into the economic mainstream.

3 (b) The General Assembly finds that:

- 4 (1) The North Carolina economy of the future can provide unparalleled  
5 opportunity while maintaining North Carolina's traditional values, if  
6 the State pursues the future with clarity of purpose and perseverance;  
7 (2) The North Carolina economy is in the midst of a massive transition  
8 created by technological changes, global competition, and new  
9 production practices; and  
10 (3) In order to maintain employment opportunities, increase income  
11 levels, reduce poverty, and generate the public revenues necessary to  
12 provide public services, North Carolina must increasingly rely on an  
13 economy which adds value to its natural and human resources and  
14 provides a diverse mix of products.

15 (c) The North Carolina Progress Board shall:

- 16 (1) Encourage ~~the a~~ discussion ~~and toward~~ understanding ~~of the~~ critical  
17 global-global, national, statewide, regional, and local demographic,  
18 social, economic, and environmental and trends and conditions that  
19 exist or are emerging in North Carolina today, will impact living in  
20 North Carolina in 10 to 20 years; national social and economic trends  
21 that will affect North Carolina in the coming decades;  
22 (2) Examine the report of the Commission for a Competitive North  
23 Carolina and the 1997 and February 2000 reports of the North Carolina  
24 Board to the General Assembly; the 1997 report of the North Carolina  
25 Progress Board to the General Assembly;  
26 (3) Track the eight issue areas set out in subsection (a) of this section and  
27 the objectives set out in subsection (a1) of this section and other issues  
28 identified by the Progress Board. The Progress Board may, upon vote  
29 of the Board, add to those issues identified by its predecessor  
30 Commission and Board;  
31 (4) Hold public hearings and other methods of public participation,  
32 including educational and outreach programs, to secure the views of  
33 citizens on priority goals for North Carolina and to disseminate  
34 findings and recommendations to policymakers;  
35 (5) Formulate and submit to North Carolinians a report every five years,  
36 beginning 2001, that updates the ~~20-10-~~ to 30-20-year vision for North  
37 Carolina and that describes and explains a vision for North Carolina's  
38 progress over the next ~~2010~~ to 3020 years;  
39 (6) Submit a report to the General Assembly prior to its convening the  
40 regular session every odd-numbered year, which reports on  
41 demographic, social and social, economic-economic, or environmental  
42 trends and issues-recommends specific targets and milestones to  
43 accomplish its mission;

- 1           (7) ~~Recommend~~ Recommend, by reporting special legislative provisions,  
2 in draft form only, how ~~the~~ targets and milestones can be applied to  
3 increase ~~the~~ accountability of government to the people of this State;  
4           (8) Report periodically to the people of North Carolina on progress toward  
5 meeting goals, targets, and ~~milestones;~~ milestone, together with an  
6 assessment of the failure to meet same, and where possible, an  
7 estimate of the potential costs associated with failure to act;  
8           (9) Undertake new and ongoing policy research and benchmarking  
9 studies;  
10          (10) Publish and distribute periodic reports on policies, performance  
11 improvement, ~~and~~ best practices and trends for ~~meeting~~ achieving the  
12 ~~long-term~~ long-term, strategic goals for the State; and  
13          (11) May apply for and accept gifts or ~~grants;~~ grants, or engage in  
14 consulting activities, or other contractual assignments, consistent with  
15 its mission, for which applicable staff or Board members may expect  
16 to receive reasonable fees and expenses in exchange for specific work  
17 products.

18          (d) ~~The~~ Any Regular Session of the General Assembly shall further define the  
19 mission of the North Carolina Progress Board in continuing its ~~work;~~ work, and may  
20 from time to time, and to the extent practicable, request staff assistance from the Board  
21 to standing, select, or independent legislative study commissions.

22          (e) The General Assembly, after adopting the initial set of goals and measures as  
23 proposed or amended, may alter the goals and measures."

24           **SECTION 3.** G.S. 143B-372.3 reads as rewritten:

25 **"§ 143B-372.3. Staff.**

26          (a) ~~The Chancellor of North Carolina State University~~ Upon the recommendation  
27 of the Board, the Governor shall appoint an Executive Director who shall serve at the  
28 pleasure of the ~~Chancellor.~~ Board and the Governor, but for administrative purposes,  
29 shall report to the head of the noninstitutional programs at the Board of Governors of  
30 the University. The Executive Director shall report to the North Carolina Progress  
31 Board and the ~~Chancellor.~~ Governor. The Executive Director shall hire or contract with  
32 support staff, who shall work at the pleasure of the Executive Director.

33          (b) The Office of State Budget, Planning, and Management shall also provide  
34 support, information, reports, and other assistance to the North Carolina Progress Board  
35 as requested.

36          (c) Repealed by Session Laws 1999-237, s. 10.12(a), effective June 30, 1999."

37           **SECTION 4.** This act is effective when it becomes law.
