2 AN ACT TO AMEND VARIOUS CRIMINAL LAWS FOR THE PURPOSE OF  
3 IMPROVING TRIAL COURT EFFICIENCY.

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5  
6 **PART I. EXTEND THE PERIOD OF TIME TO AVOID THE COURT COSTS FOR**  
7 **FAILURE TO PAY**

8 **SECTION 1.(a)** G.S. 7A-304(a) reads as rewritten:

9 "(a) In every criminal case in the superior or district court, wherein the defendant is  
10 convicted, or enters a plea of guilty or nolo contendere, or when costs are assessed against the  
11 prosecuting witness, the following costs shall be assessed and collected. No costs may be  
12 assessed when a case is dismissed. Only upon entry of a written order, supported by findings of  
13 fact and conclusions of law, determining that there is just cause, the court may (i) waive costs  
14 assessed under this section or (ii) waive or reduce costs assessed under subdivision (7), (8),  
15 (8a), (11), (12), or (13) of this section.

16 ...

17 (6) For support of the General Court of Justice, the sum of two hundred dollars  
18 (\$200.00) is payable by a defendant who fails to appear to answer the charge  
19 as scheduled, unless within 20 days after the scheduled appearance, the  
20 person either appears in court to answer the charge or disposes of the charge  
21 pursuant to G.S. 7A-146, and the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) is payable by  
22 a defendant who fails to pay a fine, penalty, or costs within ~~20 days~~ 40 days  
23 of the date specified in the court's judgment. Upon a showing to the court  
24 that the defendant failed to appear because of an error or omission of a  
25 judicial official, a prosecutor, or a law-enforcement officer, the court shall  
26 waive the fee for failure to appear. These fees shall be remitted to the State  
27 Treasurer.

28 ...."

29 **SECTION 1.(b)** G.S. 20-24.2(a) reads as rewritten:

30 "(a) The court must report to the Division the name of any person charged with a motor  
31 vehicle offense under this Chapter who:

- 32 (1) Fails to appear to answer the charge as scheduled, unless within 20 days  
33 after the scheduled appearance, he either appears in court to answer the  
34 charge or disposes of the charge pursuant to G.S. 7A-146; or  
35 (2) Fails to pay a fine, penalty, or costs within ~~20 days~~ 40 days of the date  
36 specified in the court's judgment."



1           **SECTION 1.(c)** This section becomes effective July 1, 2015, and applies to fees  
2 assessed on or after that date.

3  
4 **PART II. DIRECT THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS TO REPORT**  
5 **ON CERTAIN ORDERS OF REMAND FROM SUPERIOR COURT**

6           **SECTION 2.** The Administrative Office of the Courts, in consultation with the  
7 Conference of Clerks of Superior Court, shall make any necessary modifications to its  
8 information systems to maintain records of all cases in which the defendant in a criminal case  
9 withdraws an appeal for trial de novo in superior court and the superior court judge has signed  
10 an order remanding the case to the district court and shall report on those remanded cases to the  
11 Chairs of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety, the Chairs of the  
12 House Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety, and the Chairs of the Joint  
13 Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety by February 1 of each year. The  
14 report shall (i) include the total number of remanded cases and also the total number of those  
15 cases for which the court has remitted costs and (ii) aggregate those totals by the district in  
16 which they were granted and by the name of each judge ordering remand. The Administrative  
17 Office of the Courts may obtain any information that may be needed from individual clerks of  
18 superior court in order to make the modifications necessary to maintain the records required  
19 under this section.

20  
21 **PART III. REVISE THE LAW AUTHORIZING A CHIEF DISTRICT COURT JUDGE**  
22 **TO DESIGNATE CERTAIN MAGISTRATES TO APPOINT COUNSEL/AUTHORIZE**  
23 **MAGISTRATES TO ACCEPT GUILTY PLEAS AND ENTER JUDGMENT FOR**  
24 **OFFENSE OF INTOXICATED AND DISRUPTIVE IN PUBLIC**

25           **SECTION 3.(a)** G.S. 7A-146 reads as rewritten:

26 "**§ 7A-146. Administrative authority and duties of chief district judge.**

27           The chief district judge, subject to the general supervision of the Chief Justice of the  
28 Supreme Court, has administrative supervision and authority over the operation of the district  
29 courts and magistrates in his district. These powers and duties include, but are not limited to,  
30 the following:

31           ...

- 32           (11) Designating certain magistrates to appoint counsel and accept waivers of  
33 counsel pursuant to Article 36 of this Chapter. This designation ~~may only be~~  
34 ~~given to magistrates who are duly licensed attorneys and~~ does not give any  
35 magistrate the authority ~~to: (i) to~~ appoint counsel or accept waivers of  
36 counsel for potentially capital offenses, as defined by rules adopted by the  
37 Office of Indigent Defense Services; ~~or (ii) accept a waiver of~~  
38 ~~counsel.~~ Services.

39           ...."

40           **SECTION 3.(b)** G.S. 7A-292 reads as rewritten:

41 "**§ 7A-292. Additional powers of magistrates.**

42           In addition to the jurisdiction and powers assigned in this Chapter to the magistrate in civil  
43 and criminal actions, each magistrate has the following additional powers:

44           ...

- 45           (15) When authorized by the chief district judge, as permitted in  
46 G.S. 7A-146(11), to provide for appointment of counsel and acceptance of  
47 waivers of counsel pursuant to Article 36 of this Chapter.

48           ...."

49           **SECTION 3.(c)** G.S. 14-444 reads as rewritten:

50 "**§ 14-444. Intoxicated and disruptive in public.**

- 1 (a) It shall be unlawful for any person in a public place to be intoxicated and disruptive  
 2 in any of the following ways:  
 3 (1) Blocking or otherwise interfering with traffic on a highway or public  
 4 vehicular area, or  
 5 (2) Blocking or lying across or otherwise preventing or interfering with access  
 6 to or passage across a sidewalk or entrance to a building, or  
 7 (3) Grabbing, shoving, pushing or fighting others or challenging others to fight,  
 8 or  
 9 (4) Cursing or shouting at or otherwise rudely insulting others, or  
 10 (5) Begging for money or other property.  
 11 (b) Any person who violates this section shall be guilty of a Class 3  
 12 misdemeanor. ~~Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 7A-273(1), a magistrate is not~~  
 13 ~~empowered to accept a guilty plea and enter judgment for this offense."~~  
 14

15 **PART IV. AMEND THE LAW REGARDING ACCESS TO FEDERAL CRIMINAL**  
 16 **INFORMATION BY CJLEADS**

17 **SECTION 4.** G.S. 143B-426.38A(g) reads as rewritten:

- 18 "(g) Provisions on Privacy and Confidentiality of Information.  
 19 (1) Status with respect to certain information. – The State CIO and the GDAC  
 20 shall be deemed to be all of the following for the purposes of this section:  
 21 a. With respect to criminal information, and to the extent allowed by  
 22 federal law, a criminal justice agency (CJA), as defined under  
 23 Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Security Policy. The  
 24 State CJIS Systems Agency (CSA) shall ensure that CJLEADS  
 25 receives access to federal criminal information deemed to be  
 26 essential in managing CJLEADS to support criminal justice  
 27 professionals, professionals and State-appointed public defenders who  
 28 are permanent employees of the State of North Carolina. However, in  
 29 no event shall State-appointed public defenders have access to  
 30 nonpublic information about unserved warrants, victims, or  
 31 witnesses.

32 ..."

34 **PART V. CONFORM STATE LAW WITH THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT**  
 35 **DECISION IN HALL V. FLORIDA**

36 **SECTION 5.** G.S. 15A-2005 reads as rewritten:

37 "**§ 15A-2005. ~~Mentally retarded defendants; Intellectual disability; death sentence~~**  
 38 **prohibited.**

- 39 (a) (1) The following definitions apply in this section:  
 40 a. ~~Mentally retarded. Intellectual disability.~~ – A condition marked by  
 41 Significantly—significantly subaverage general intellectual  
 42 functioning, existing concurrently with significant limitations in  
 43 adaptive functioning, both of which were manifested before the age  
 44 of 18.  
 45 b. Significant limitations in adaptive functioning. – Significant  
 46 limitations in two or more of the following adaptive skill areas:  
 47 communication, self-care, home living, social skills, community use,  
 48 self-direction, health and safety, functional academics, leisure skills  
 49 and work skills.  
 50 c. Significantly subaverage general intellectual functioning. – An  
 51 intelligence quotient of 70 or below.

1 (2) The defendant has the burden of proving significantly subaverage general  
2 intellectual functioning, significant limitations in adaptive functioning, and  
3 that ~~mental retardation~~ intellectual disability was manifested before the age  
4 of 18. An intelligence quotient of 70 or below on an individually  
5 administered, scientifically recognized standardized intelligence quotient test  
6 administered by a licensed psychiatrist or psychologist is evidence of  
7 significantly subaverage general intellectual functioning; however, it is not  
8 sufficient, without evidence of significant limitations in adaptive functioning  
9 and without evidence of manifestation before the age of 18, to establish that  
10 the defendant ~~is mentally retarded~~ has an intellectual disability. An  
11 intelligence quotient of 70, as described in this subdivision, is approximate  
12 and a higher score resulting from the application of the standard error of  
13 measurement to an intelligence quotient of 70 shall not preclude the  
14 defendant from being able to present additional evidence of intellectual  
15 disability, including testimony regarding adaptive deficits. Accepted clinical  
16 standards for diagnosing significant limitations in intellectual functioning  
17 and adaptive behavior shall be applied in the determination of intellectual  
18 disability.

19 (b) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, no defendant ~~who is mentally~~  
20 ~~retarded with an intellectual disability~~ shall be sentenced to death.

21 (c) Upon motion of the defendant, supported by appropriate affidavits, the court may  
22 order a pretrial hearing to determine if the defendant ~~is mentally retarded~~ has an intellectual  
23 disability. The court shall order such a hearing with the consent of the State. The defendant has  
24 the burden of production and persuasion to demonstrate ~~mental retardation~~ intellectual  
25 disability by clear and convincing evidence. If the court determines that the defendant to be  
26 ~~mentally retarded~~ has an intellectual disability, the court shall declare the case noncapital, and  
27 the State may not seek the death penalty against the defendant.

28 (d) The pretrial determination of the court shall not preclude the defendant from raising  
29 any legal defense during the trial.

30 (e) If the court does not find that the defendant to be mentally retarded has an  
31 intellectual disability in the pretrial proceeding, upon the introduction of evidence ~~of the~~  
32 ~~defendant's mental retardation~~ raising the issue of intellectual disability during the sentencing  
33 hearing, the court shall submit a special issue to the jury as to whether the defendant ~~is mentally~~  
34 ~~retarded~~ has an intellectual disability as defined in this section. This special issue shall be  
35 considered and answered by the jury prior to the consideration of aggravating or mitigating  
36 factors and the determination of sentence. If the jury determines that the defendant to be  
37 ~~mentally retarded~~ has an intellectual disability, the court shall declare the case noncapital and  
38 the defendant shall be sentenced to life imprisonment.

39 (f) The defendant has the burden of production and persuasion to demonstrate ~~mental~~  
40 ~~retardation~~ intellectual disability to the jury by a preponderance of the evidence.

41 (g) If the jury determines that the defendant ~~is not mentally retarded~~ does not have an  
42 intellectual disability as defined by this section, the jury may consider any evidence of ~~mental~~  
43 ~~retardation~~ intellectual disability presented during the sentencing hearing when determining  
44 aggravating or mitigating factors and the defendant's sentence.

45 (h) The provisions of this section do not preclude the sentencing of ~~a mentally~~  
46 ~~retarded~~ an offender with an intellectual disability to any other sentence authorized by  
47 G.S. 14-17 for the crime of murder in the first degree."  
48

49 **PART VI. PROVIDE THAT THE REQUIREMENT FOR A PERSON CONVICTED OF**  
50 **SEXUAL BATTERY TO REGISTER AS A SEX OFFENDER IS DISCRETIONARY**  
51 **WITH THE COURT**

1           **SECTION 6.(a)** G.S. 14-27.5A is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

2           "**(c)** When a person is convicted of a violation of this section, the sentencing court shall  
3 consider whether the person is a danger to the community and whether requiring the person to  
4 register as a sex offender pursuant to Article 27A of this Chapter would further the purposes of  
5 that Article as stated in G.S. 14-208.5. If the sentencing court finds that the person is a danger  
6 to the community and that the person shall register, then an order shall be entered requiring the  
7 person to register."

8           **SECTION 6.(b)** G.S. 14-208.6(4) reads as rewritten:

9           "(4) "Reportable conviction" means:

10           ...

11           f. A final conviction for a violation of G.S. 14-27.5A, only if the court  
12 sentencing the individual issues an order pursuant to  
13 G.S. 14-27.5A(c) requiring the individual to register."

14           **SECTION 6.(c)** G.S. 14-208.6(5) reads as rewritten:

15           "(5) "Sexually violent offense" means a violation of G.S. 14-27.2 (first degree  
16 rape), G.S. 14-27.2A (rape of a child; adult offender), G.S. 14-27.3 (second  
17 degree rape), G.S. 14-27.4 (first degree sexual offense), G.S. 14-27.4A (sex  
18 offense with a child; adult offender), G.S. 14-27.5 (second degree sexual  
19 offense), ~~G.S. 14-27.5A (sexual battery)~~, former G.S. 14-27.6 (attempted  
20 rape or sexual offense), G.S. 14-27.7 (intercourse and sexual offense with  
21 certain victims), G.S. 14-27.7A(a) (statutory rape or sexual offense of person  
22 who is 13-, 14-, or 15-years-old where the defendant is at least six years  
23 older), G.S. 14-43.11 (human trafficking) if (i) the offense is committed  
24 against a minor who is less than 18 years of age or (ii) the offense is  
25 committed against any person with the intent that they be held in sexual  
26 servitude, G.S. 14-43.13 (subjecting or maintaining a person for sexual  
27 servitude), G.S. 14-178 (incest between near relatives), G.S. 14-190.6  
28 (employing or permitting minor to assist in offenses against public morality  
29 and decency), G.S. 14-190.9(a1) (felonious indecent exposure),  
30 G.S. 14-190.16 (first degree sexual exploitation of a minor), G.S. 14-190.17  
31 (second degree sexual exploitation of a minor), G.S. 14-190.17A (third  
32 degree sexual exploitation of a minor), G.S. 14-202.1 (taking indecent  
33 liberties with children), G.S. 14-202.3 (Solicitation of child by computer or  
34 certain other electronic devices to commit an unlawful sex act),  
35 G.S. 14-202.4(a) (taking indecent liberties with a student), G.S. 14-205.2(c)  
36 or (d) (patronizing a prostitute who is a minor or a mentally disabled  
37 person), G.S. 14-205.3(b) (promoting prostitution of a minor or a mentally  
38 disabled person), G.S. 14-318.4(a1) (parent or caretaker commit or permit  
39 act of prostitution with or by a juvenile), or G.S. 14-318.4(a2) (commission  
40 or allowing of sexual act upon a juvenile by parent or guardian). The term  
41 also includes the following: a solicitation or conspiracy to commit any of  
42 these offenses; aiding and abetting any of these offenses."

43           **SECTION 6.(d)** G.S. 50-13.1(a1) reads as rewritten:

44           "(a1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any person instituting an action or  
45 proceeding for custody ex parte who has been convicted of a sexually violent offense as  
46 defined in G.S. 14-208.6(5) or who has been convicted of an offense under G.S. 14-27.5A and  
47 ordered to register under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes shall disclose the  
48 conviction in the pleadings."

49           **SECTION 6.(e)** This section becomes effective December 1, 2015, and applies to  
50 sentences imposed on or after that date.

1 **PART VII. AMENDMENTS TO CERTAIN LAWS REGARDING TRANSPORTATION**  
2 **OF AND CUSTODY ORDERS FOR PERSONS BEING INVOLUNTARILY**  
3 **COMMITTED**

4 **SECTION 7.(a)** G.S. 122C-251(d) reads as rewritten:

5 "(d) ~~In~~To the extent feasible, in providing transportation of a respondent, a city or  
6 county shall provide a driver or attendant who is the same sex as the respondent, unless the  
7 law-enforcement officer allows a family member of the respondent to accompany the  
8 respondent in lieu of an attendant of the same sex as the respondent."

9 **SECTION 7.(b)** Part 8 of Article 5 of Chapter 122C of the General Statutes is  
10 amended by adding a new section to read:

11 **"§ 122C-295. Electronic and facsimile transmission of custody orders.**

12 A custody order entered by the clerk or magistrate pursuant to this Chapter may be  
13 delivered to the law enforcement officer by electronic or facsimile transmission."  
14

15 **PART VIII. PETITION AND ORDER TO DISPOSE OF FIREARM MAY BE**  
16 **TRANSMITTED ELECTRONICALLY OR BY FACSIMILE**

17 **SECTION 8.(a)** G.S. 14-269.1 reads as rewritten:

18 **"§ 14-269.1. Confiscation and disposition of deadly weapons.**

19 (a) Upon conviction of any person for violation of G.S. 14-269, G.S. 14-269.7, or any  
20 other offense involving the use of a deadly weapon of a type referred to in G.S. 14-269, the  
21 deadly weapon with reference to which the defendant shall have been convicted shall be  
22 ordered confiscated and disposed of by the presiding judge at the trial in one of the following  
23 ways in the discretion of the presiding judge.

24 (1) By ordering the weapon returned to its rightful owner, but only when such  
25 owner is a person other than the defendant and has filed a petition for the  
26 recovery of such weapon with the presiding judge at the time of the  
27 defendant's conviction, and upon a finding by the presiding judge that  
28 petitioner is entitled to possession of same and that he was unlawfully  
29 deprived of the same without his consent.

30 (2), (3) Repealed by Session Laws 1994, Ex. Sess., c. 16, s. 2.

31 (4) By ordering such weapon turned over to the sheriff of the county in which  
32 the trial is held or his duly authorized agent to be destroyed if the firearm  
33 does not have a legible, unique identification number or is unsafe for use  
34 because of wear, damage, age, or modification. The sheriff shall maintain a  
35 record of the destruction thereof.

36 (4a) Repealed by Session Laws 2005-287, s. 3, effective August 22, 2005.

37 (4b) By ordering the weapon turned over to a law enforcement agency in the  
38 county of trial for (i) the official use of the agency or (ii) sale, trade, or  
39 exchange by the agency to a federally licensed firearm dealer in accordance  
40 with all applicable State and federal firearm laws. The court may order a  
41 disposition of the firearm pursuant to this subdivision only upon the written  
42 request of the head or chief of the law enforcement agency and only if the  
43 firearm has a legible, unique identification number. If the law enforcement  
44 agency sells the firearm, then the proceeds of the sale shall be remitted to the  
45 appropriate county finance officer as provided by G.S. 115C-452 to be used  
46 to maintain free public schools. The receiving law enforcement agency shall  
47 maintain a record and inventory of all firearms received pursuant to this  
48 subdivision.

49 (5) By ordering such weapon turned over to the North Carolina State Crime  
50 Laboratory's weapons reference library for official use by that agency. The

1 Laboratory shall maintain a record and inventory of all such weapons  
2 received.  
3 (6) By ordering such weapons turned over to the North Carolina Justice  
4 Academy for official use by that agency. The North Carolina Justice  
5 Academy shall maintain a record and inventory of all such weapons  
6 received.

7 (b) Any petition or order to dispose of a weapon may entered pursuant to this section  
8 may be transmitted electronically or by facsimile to the appropriate person, sheriff, or agency."

9 **SECTION 8.(b)** G.S. 15-11.1(b1) reads as rewritten:

10 "(b1) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b) of this section or any other provision of  
11 law, if the property seized is a firearm and the district attorney determines the firearm is no  
12 longer necessary or useful as evidence in a criminal trial, the district attorney, after notice to all  
13 parties known or believed by the district attorney to have an ownership or a possessory interest  
14 in the firearm, including the defendant, shall apply to the court for an order of disposition of the  
15 firearm. The judge, after hearing, may order the disposition of the firearm in one of the  
16 following ways:

- 17 (1) By ordering the firearm returned to its rightful owner, when the rightful  
18 owner is someone other than the defendant and upon findings by the court (i)  
19 that the person, firm, or corporation determined by the court to be the  
20 rightful owner is entitled to possession of the firearm and (ii) that the person,  
21 firm, or corporation determined by the court to be the rightful owner of the  
22 firearm was unlawfully deprived of the same or had no knowledge or  
23 reasonable belief of the defendant's intention to use the firearm unlawfully.  
24 (2) By ordering the firearm returned to the defendant, but only if the defendant  
25 is not convicted of any criminal offense in connection with the possession or  
26 use of the firearm, the defendant is the rightful owner of the firearm, and the  
27 defendant is not otherwise ineligible to possess such firearm.  
28 (3) By ordering the firearm turned over to be destroyed by the sheriff of the  
29 county in which the firearm was seized or by his duly authorized agent if the  
30 firearm does not have a legible, unique identification number or is unsafe for  
31 use because of wear, damage, age, or modification. The sheriff shall  
32 maintain a record of the destruction of the firearm.  
33 (4) By ordering the firearm turned over to a law enforcement agency in the  
34 county of trial for (i) the official use of the agency or (ii) sale, trade, or  
35 exchange by the agency to a federally licensed firearm dealer in accordance  
36 with all applicable State and federal firearm laws. The court may order a  
37 disposition of the firearm pursuant to this subdivision only if the firearm has  
38 a legible, unique identification number. If the law enforcement agency sells  
39 the firearm, then the proceeds of the sale shall be remitted to the appropriate  
40 county finance officer as provided by G.S. 115C-452 to be used to maintain  
41 free public schools. The receiving law enforcement agency shall maintain a  
42 record and inventory of all firearms received pursuant to this subdivision.

43 This subsection (b1) is not applicable to seizures pursuant to G.S. 113-137 of firearms used  
44 only in connection with a violation of Article 22 of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes or any  
45 local wildlife hunting ordinance. Any petition or order to dispose of a firearm made pursuant to  
46 this subsection may be transmitted electronically or by facsimile to the appropriate person,  
47 sheriff, or law enforcement agency."

48  
49 **PART IX. EXPUNCTION INFORMATION MAY BE TRANSMITTED**  
50 **ELECTRONICALLY OR BY FACSIMILE**

51 **SECTION 9.** G.S. 15A-150 reads as rewritten:

1 **"§ 15A-150. Notification requirements.**

2 (a) Notification to AOC. – The clerk of superior court in each county in North Carolina  
3 shall, as soon as practicable after each term of court, file with the Administrative Office of the  
4 Courts the names of the following:

- 5 (1) Persons granted an expunction under this Article.
- 6 (2) Persons granted a conditional discharge under G.S. 14-50.29.
- 7 (3) Persons granted a conditional discharge under G.S. 90-96 or G.S. 90-113.14.
- 8 (4) Repealed by Session Laws 2010-174, s. 7, effective October 1, 2010.
- 9 (5) Persons granted a conditional discharge under G.S. 14-204.

10 (b) Notification to Other State and Local Agencies. – ~~The~~ Unless otherwise instructed  
11 by the Administrative Office of the Courts pursuant to an agreement entered into under  
12 subsection (e) of this section for the electronic or facsimile transmission of information, the  
13 clerk of superior court in each county in North Carolina shall send a certified copy of an order  
14 granting an expunction to a person named in subsection (a) of this section to all of the agencies  
15 listed in this subsection. An agency receiving an order under this subsection shall expunge from  
16 its records all entries made as a result of the charge or conviction ordered expunged, except as  
17 provided in G.S. 15A-151. The list of agencies is as follows:

- 18 (1) The sheriff, chief of police, or other arresting agency.
- 19 (2) When applicable, the Division of Motor Vehicles and the Division of Adult  
20 Correction of the Department of Public Safety.
- 21 (3) Any State or local agency identified by the petition as bearing record of the  
22 offense that has been expunged.
- 23 (4) The Department of Public Safety.

24 (c) Notification to FBI. – The Department of Public Safety shall forward the order  
25 received under this section to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

26 (d) Notification to Private Entities. – A State agency that receives a certified copy of an  
27 order under this section shall notify any private entity with which it has a licensing agreement  
28 for bulk extracts of data from the agency criminal record database to delete the record in  
29 question. The private entity shall notify any other entity to which it subsequently provides in a  
30 bulk extract data from the agency criminal database to delete the record in question from its  
31 database.

32 (e) The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts may enter into an agreement  
33 with any of the State agencies listed in subsection (b) of this section for electronic or facsimile  
34 transmission of any information that must be provided under this section."

35  
36 **PART X. DOUBLING OF BOND IS PERMISSIVE RATHER THAN MANDATORY**  
37 **FOR CERTAIN DEFENDANTS**

38 **SECTION 10.(a)** G.S. 15A-534(d1) reads as rewritten:

39 "(d1) When conditions of pretrial release are being imposed on a defendant who has failed  
40 on one or more prior occasions to appear to answer one or more of the charges to which the  
41 conditions apply, the judicial official shall at a minimum impose the conditions of pretrial  
42 release that are recommended in any order for the arrest of the defendant that was issued for the  
43 defendant's most recent failure to appear. If no conditions are recommended in that order for  
44 arrest, the judicial official ~~shall~~ may require the execution of a secured appearance bond in an  
45 amount at least double the amount of the most recent previous secured or unsecured bond for  
46 the charges or, if no bond has yet been required for the charges, in the amount of at least one  
47 thousand dollars (\$1,000). The judicial official shall also impose such restrictions on the travel,  
48 associations, conduct, or place of abode of the defendant as will assure that the defendant will  
49 not again fail to appear. The judicial official shall indicate on the release order that the  
50 defendant was arrested or surrendered after failing to appear as required under a prior release  
51 order. If the information available to the judicial official indicates that the defendant has failed



1 on two or more prior occasions to appear to answer the charges, the judicial official shall  
2 indicate that fact on the release order."

3 **SECTION 10.(b)** This section becomes effective July 1, 2015, and applies to  
4 conditions of pretrial release imposed on or after that date.

5  
6 **PART XI. DISPOSITION OF CERTAIN PHYSICAL EVIDENCE THAT MAY**  
7 **CONTAIN BIOLOGICAL EVIDENCE**

8 **SECTION 11.(a)** G.S. 15A-268(a5) reads as rewritten:

9 "(a5) The duty to preserve may not be waived knowingly and voluntarily by a defendant,  
10 without a court ~~proceeding-hearing~~, which may include any other hearing associated with the  
11 disposition of the case."

12 **SECTION 11.(b)** G.S. 15A-268(a6) reads as rewritten:

13 "(a6) The evidence described by subsection (a1) of this section shall be preserved for the  
14 following period:

- 15 (1) For conviction resulting in a sentence of death, until execution.
- 16 (2) For conviction resulting in a sentence of life without parole, until the death  
17 of the convicted person.
- 18 (3) For conviction of any homicide, sex offense, assault, kidnapping, burglary,  
19 robbery, arson or burning, for which a Class B1-E felony punishment is  
20 imposed, the evidence shall be preserved during the period of incarceration  
21 and mandatory supervised release, including sex offender registration  
22 pursuant to Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes, except in  
23 cases where the person convicted entered and was convicted on a plea of  
24 guilty, in which case the evidence shall be preserved for the earlier of three  
25 years from the date of conviction or until released.
- 26 (4) Biological evidence collected as part of a criminal investigation of any  
27 homicide or rape, in which no charges are filed, shall be preserved for the  
28 period of time that the crime remains ~~unsolved~~. unsolved, unless the State  
29 certifies that charges will not be brought even if a perpetrator can be  
30 identified. At any time, after collection and prior to the filing of charges, the  
31 State may seek a judicial determination as to whether the evidence collected  
32 has biological evidence value and should be preserved, but is of a size, bulk,  
33 or physical character as to render retention impracticable or should be  
34 returned to its rightful owner. Upon such finding, the court may order that  
35 the collecting agency take reasonable measures to remove or preserve, for  
36 retention, portions of evidence likely to contain biological evidence related  
37 to the offense through cuttings, swabs, or other means consistent with Crime  
38 Laboratory minimum guidelines in a quantity sufficient to permit DNA  
39 testing before returning or disposing of the evidence.
- 40 (5) A custodial agency in custody of biological evidence unrelated to a criminal  
41 investigation or prosecution referenced by subdivision (1), (2), (3), or (4) of  
42 this subsection may dispose of the evidence in accordance with the rules of  
43 the agency.
- 44 (6) At any time after a defendant is charged and prior to disposition, if the  
45 evidence collected as part of the criminal investigation is of a size, bulk, or  
46 physical character as to render retention impracticable or should be returned  
47 to its rightful owner, then the State and the defendant may enter into a  
48 consent motion providing for the retention of swabs or other items used for  
49 processing evidence in lieu of the actual physical evidence and the court may  
50 order that the collecting agency take reasonable measures to remove or  
51 preserve for retention portions of evidence likely to contain biological

1 evidence related to the offense through cuttings, swabs, or other means  
 2 consistent with Crime Laboratory minimum guidelines in a quantity  
 3 sufficient to permit DNA testing before returning or disposing of the  
 4 evidence.

5 (7) Notwithstanding the foregoing preservation requirements, at the time of  
 6 conviction, the State and the defendant may enter into a consent motion  
 7 providing for the destruction or return of physical evidence not offered or  
 8 admitted into evidence during the criminal proceeding. The consent motion  
 9 shall include an inventory of the evidence. The court may order destruction  
 10 or return of any items of physical evidence inventoried in the consent  
 11 motion."

12 SECTION 11.(c) This section becomes effective October 1, 2015.

13  
 14 **PART XII. AMEND THE RULES OF EVIDENCE TO ALLOW A CERTIFICATION**  
 15 **BY THE CUSTODIAN OF A BUSINESS RECORD TO SHOW THE AUTHENTICITY**  
 16 **OF THE RECORD IN LIEU OF OFFERING THE CUSTODIAN'S IN-PERSON**  
 17 **TESTIMONY**

18 SECTION 12.(a) Rule 803(6) of the Rules of Evidence, Chapter 8C of the General  
 19 Statutes, reads as rewritten:

20 **"Rule 803. Hearsay exceptions; availability of declarant immaterial.**

21 The following are not excluded by the hearsay rule, even though the declarant is available  
 22 as a witness:

23 ...  
 24 (6) Records of Regularly Conducted Activity. – A memorandum, report, record,  
 25 or data compilation, in any form, of acts, events, conditions, opinions, or  
 26 diagnoses, made at or near the time by, or from information transmitted by, a  
 27 person with knowledge, if (i) kept in the course of a regularly conducted  
 28 business activity, ~~activity~~ and if (ii) it was the regular practice of that  
 29 business activity to make the memorandum, report, record, or data  
 30 compilation, all as shown by the testimony of the custodian or other  
 31 qualified ~~witness,~~ witness or by a certification made by the custodian or  
 32 witness, unless the source of information or the method or circumstances of  
 33 preparation indicate lack of trustworthiness. The proponent shall give  
 34 advance notice of intent to offer such records to all other parties. The method  
 35 of authenticating evidence allowed under this subdivision shall be confined  
 36 to the records of non-parties. The term "business" as used in this paragraph  
 37 includes business, institution, association, profession, occupation, and  
 38 calling of every kind, whether or not conducted for profit."

39 SECTION 12.(b) This section becomes effective October 1, 2015.

 41 **PART XIII. CLARIFY ENHANCED PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF PROTECTIVE**  
 42 **ORDER**

43 SECTION 13. G.S. 50B-4.1(d) reads as rewritten:

44 "(d) Unless covered under some other provision of law providing greater punishment, a  
 45 person who commits a felony at a time when the person knows the behavior is prohibited by a  
 46 valid protective order as provided in subsection (a) of this section shall be guilty of a felony  
 47 one class higher than the principal felony described in the charging document. This subsection  
 48 shall not apply to ~~a person who is charged with or convicted~~ convictions of a Class A or B1  
 49 felony or ~~to a person charged under~~ convictions of the offenses set forth in subsection (f) or  
 50 subsection (g) of this section."  
 51

1 **PART XIV. ALLOW EXTENSION OF ORDER ENTERED IN STREET GANG**  
2 **NUISANCE ABATEMENT CASE AFTER COURT HEARING**

3 **SECTION 14.** G.S. 14-50.43(d) reads as rewritten:

4 "(d) An order entered under this section shall expire one year after ~~entry; however, the~~  
5 entry unless extended by the Court for good cause established by the plaintiff after a hearing.  
6 The order may be modified, rescinded, or vacated at any time prior to its expiration date upon  
7 the motion of any party if it appears to the court that one or more of the defendants is no longer  
8 engaging in criminal street gang activities."

9  
10 **PART XV. AMEND CERTIFICATE OF RELIEF**

11 **SECTION 15.(a)** G.S. 15A-173.2(a) reads as rewritten:

12 "(a) An individual who is convicted of ~~no more than two Class G, H, or I felonies or~~  
13 ~~misdemeanors in one session of court, and who has no other convictions for a felony or~~  
14 ~~misdemeanor other than a traffic violation,~~ criminal offenses no higher than a Class G felony,  
15 may petition the court where the individual was convicted of his or her most serious offense for  
16 a Certificate of Relief relieving collateral consequences as permitted by this Article. Except as  
17 otherwise provided in this subsection, the petition shall be heard by the senior resident superior  
18 court judge if the convictions were in superior court, or the chief district court judge if the  
19 convictions were in district court. The senior resident superior court judge and chief district  
20 court judge in each district may delegate their authority to hold hearings and issue, modify, or  
21 revoke Certificates of Relief to judges, clerks, or magistrates in that district."

22 **SECTION 15.(b)** This section becomes effective October 1, 2015, and applies to  
23 certificates issued on or after that date.

25 **PART XVI. EFFECTIVE DATE**

26 **SECTION 16.** Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes  
27 law.
