A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO IMPOSE A MORATORIUM ON THE AWARD OF NEW OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS AND TO ENACT OTHER ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES FOR OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS AND PERSONAL EDUCATION STUDENT ACCOUNTS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**PART I. MORATORIUM AND ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES FOR OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIPS**

**SECTION 1.(a)** Beginning with the 2024-2025 fiscal year, the State Education Assistance Authority shall not award any scholarship grant funds under Part 2A of Article 39 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes to new persons who did not receive scholarship grant funds in the prior school year. It is the intent of the General Assembly to eliminate the program for awarding scholarship grants under Part 2A of Article 39 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes beginning in the 2036-2037 school year or once all current recipients become ineligible for the receipt of scholarship grants.

**SECTION 1.(b)** Subsection (b) of G.S. 115C-562.2 is reenacted.

**SECTION 1.(c)** G.S. 115C-562.1, as amended by Section 8A.6 of S.L. 2023-134, reads as rewritten:

**"§ 115C-562.1. Definitions.**

The following definitions apply in this Part:

...

(3a) Eligible student. – A student residing in North Carolina who has not yet received a high school diploma and who meets all of the following requirements:

- a. Is eligible to attend a North Carolina public school pursuant to Article 25 of this Chapter. A child who is the age of 4 on or before April 16 is eligible to attend the following school year if the principal, or equivalent, of the school in which the child seeks to enroll finds that the student meets the requirements established by the Authority pursuant to G.S. 115C-562.2(d) and those findings are submitted to the Authority.
- b. Has not been enrolled in a postsecondary institution as a full-time student taking at least 12 hours of academic credit.



- 1 c. Has not been placed in a nonpublic school or facility by a public  
 2 agency at public expense.  
 3 d. Received a scholarship grant for the school year prior to the school  
 4 year for which the student is applying.

6 **SECTION 1.(d)** G.S. 115C-562.2, as amended by Section 8A.6(c) of S.L. 2023-134  
 7 and subsection (b) of this section, reads as rewritten:

8 "**§ 115C-562.2. Scholarship grants.**

9 (a) The Authority shall make available no later than February 1 annually applications to  
 10 eligible students for the award of scholarship grants to attend any nonpublic school on a full- or  
 11 part-time basis. Information about scholarship grants and the application process shall be made  
 12 available on the Authority's ~~Web site.~~ website. Beginning March 15, the Authority shall begin  
 13 awarding scholarship grants to students who have applied by ~~March 1 in the following order:~~

- 14 (1) ~~Eligible students who received a scholarship grant for the school year prior to~~  
 15 ~~the school year for which the students are applying.~~  
 16 (2) ~~Eligible students qualifying for a scholarship grant in the amount provided~~

23 (b) Scholarship grants awarded to eligible students residing in households with an income  
 24 level not in excess of the amount required for the student to qualify for the federal free or  
 25 reduced-price lunch program shall be, per year per eligible student, in an amount of up to ninety  
 26 percent (90%) as a full-time student or up to forty-five percent (45%) as a part-time student of  
 27 the average State per pupil allocation for average daily membership in the prior fiscal year.  
 28 Scholarship grants awarded to eligible students residing in households with an income level in  
 29 excess of the amount required for the student to qualify for the federal free or reduced-price lunch  
 30 program shall be for amounts of not more than ninety percent (90%) of the required tuition and  
 31 fees as a full-time student or forty-five percent (45%) of the required tuition and fees as a  
 32 part-time student for the nonpublic school the eligible child will attend. Tuition and fees for a  
 33 nonpublic school may include tuition and fees for books, transportation, equipment, or other  
 34 items required by the nonpublic school. No scholarship grant shall exceed, per year per eligible  
 35 student, an amount equal to ninety percent (90%) for a full-time student or forty-five percent  
 36 (45%) for a part-time student of the average State per pupil allocation for average daily  
 37 membership in the prior fiscal year, and no scholarship grant shall exceed the required tuition  
 38 and fees for the nonpublic school the eligible student will attend.

22           **SECTION 1.(e)** G.S. 115C-562.5, as amended by Sections 7.80, 8A.6, 8A.12, and  
23 8A.16 of S.L. 2023-134, reads as rewritten:

24 **"§ 115C-562.5. Obligations of nonpublic schools accepting eligible students receiving**  
25 **scholarship grants.**

26       (a) A nonpublic school that accepts eligible students receiving scholarship grants shall  
27 comply with the following:

28           (1) ~~Provide~~ Annually provide to the Authority documentation for required tuition  
29 and fees charged to the student by the nonpublic school. A nonpublic school  
30 that accepts eligible students receiving scholarship grants shall not increase  
31 tuition in a given year by more than the change in the Consumer Price Index,  
32 as calculated and reported by the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics, that is  
33 reported in the calendar year in which the tuition increase would occur.

34           (2) Provide to the Authority a criminal background check conducted for the staff  
35 member with the highest decision-making authority, as defined by the bylaws,  
36 articles of incorporation, or other governing document. Information provided  
37 to the Authority in accordance with this subdivision is privileged information  
38 and is not a public record but is for the exclusive use of the Authority.

39           (3) Provide to the parent or guardian of an eligible student, whose tuition and fees  
40 are paid in whole or in part with a scholarship grant, an annual written  
41 explanation of the student's progress, including the student's scores on  
42 standardized achievement tests.

43           (4) ~~Administer, at least once in each school year, tests as provided in this~~  
44 ~~subdivision.~~ Administer each school year all tests required by the State Board  
45 of Education pursuant to G.S. 115C-174.11(c) for students in grades three and  
46 higher in a local school administrative unit. Test performance data for students  
47 shall be submitted to the Authority by July 15 of each year. The nonpublic  
48 school shall retain this data for five years, and the Authority may audit the  
49 nonpublic school to ensure compliance with the retention requirement. Test  
50 performance data reported to the Authority or collected by the Authority under  
51 this subdivision is not a public record under Chapter 132 of the General

2 information. Tests shall be administered to all eligible students enrolled in  
3 grades three and higher whose tuition and fees are paid in whole or in part  
4 with a scholarship ~~grant~~ as follows:
- 5 a. ~~The nationally standardized test designated by the Authority in grades~~  
6 ~~three and eight.~~
- 7 b. ~~The ACT in grade 11.~~
- 8 e. ~~A nationally standardized test or other nationally standardized~~  
9 ~~equivalent measurement selected by the chief administrative officer of~~  
10 ~~the nonpublic school in all other grades four and higher. For grades~~  
11 ~~four through seven, the nationally standardized test or other equivalent~~  
12 ~~measurement selected must measure achievement in the areas of~~  
13 ~~English grammar, reading, spelling, and mathematics. For grades nine,~~  
14 ~~10, and 12, the nationally standardized test or other equivalent~~  
15 ~~measurement selected must measure either (i) achievement in the areas~~  
16 ~~of English grammar, reading, spelling, and mathematics or (ii)~~  
17 ~~competencies in the verbal and quantitative areas.~~ grant. Nothing in  
18 this subdivision shall prohibit a nonpublic school from administering  
19 additional tests to its students.
- 20 (5) Provide to the Authority graduation rates of the students receiving scholarship  
21 grants ~~grants, including four-year cohort graduation rates,~~ in a manner  
22 consistent with nationally recognized standards. Title I of the Elementary and  
23 Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, and any associated federal  
24 regulations.
- 25 (6) Contract with a certified public accountant to perform a financial review, an  
26 audit, consistent with generally accepted methods of accounting or any other  
27 comprehensive basis of accounting recognized by the American Institute of  
28 Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) for each school year in which the  
29 school enrolls 70 or more students receiving scholarship grants or scholarship  
30 funds awarded by the Authority. accepts students receiving one hundred  
31 thousand dollars (\$100,000) or more in scholarship grants awarded under this  
32 Part. If a school accepts students receiving less than one hundred thousand  
33 dollars (\$100,000), it shall contract pursuant to this subdivision for an audit  
34 every three years. A nonpublic school shall report the results of an audit by  
35 December 31 of the year in which the audit is conducted.
- 36 (7) Maintain a school facility within the State where in-person instruction is  
37 provided. This subdivision does not prohibit a school from offering  
38 remote-only courses of instruction in addition to in-person instruction.
- 39 (8) Provide the following information annually to the Division:
- 40 a. Name and address of the school, including physical location address.  
41 A school with more than one physical location shall establish a  
42 separate notice of intent for each physical location and shall provide  
43 all information required by this subdivision for each physical location.
- 44 b. The name of the owners and chief administrator. administrator,  
45 including contact information.
- 46 c. Number of students in attendance at the school as of October 1.
- 47 d. All attendance records of students receiving scholarship grants from  
48 the previous school year.
- 49 e. Documentation of a completed fire inspection in the previous 365  
50 days.

- 1           (9)    For any child with a disability who is a recipient of scholarship funds, educate  
2           that child in accordance with his or her Individualized Education Program  
3           (IEP) and in compliance with IDEA, as defined in G.S. 115C-106.3(6), and  
4           applicable policies adopted by the State Board of Education for local school  
5           administrative units under Article 9 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes.  
6           (10)   Comply with the requirements of Article 8C of this Chapter, including the  
7           following:  
8           a.     School Risk Management Plan. – The nonpublic school, in  
9           coordination with local law enforcement agencies, shall adopt a  
10           School Risk Management Plan (SRMP) relating to incidents of school  
11           violence. In constructing and maintaining these plans, the nonpublic  
12           school shall utilize the School Risk and Response Management  
13           System established pursuant to G.S. 115C-105.49A. These plans are  
14           not considered a public record as the term "public record" is defined  
15           under G.S. 132-1 and shall not be subject to inspection and  
16           examination under G.S. 132-6.  
17           b.     Schematic diagrams and school crisis kits. – The nonpublic school  
18           shall provide schematic diagrams and keys to the main entrance of  
19           school facilities to local law enforcement agencies, in addition to  
20           implementing the provisions in G.S. 115C-105.52.  
21           c.     School safety exercises. – At least once a year, the nonpublic school  
22           shall hold a full school-wide lockdown exercise with local law  
23           enforcement and emergency management agencies that are part of the  
24           school's SRMP.  
25           d.     Safety information provided to the Department of Public Safety,  
26           Division of Emergency Management. – The nonpublic school shall  
27           provide the following: (i) schematic diagrams, including digital  
28           schematic diagrams, and (ii) emergency response information  
29           requested by the Division for the SRMP. The schematic diagrams and  
30           emergency response information are not considered public records as  
31           the term "public record" is defined under G.S. 132-1 and shall not be  
32           subject to inspection and examination under G.S. 132-6.  
33           (b)    A nonpublic school that accepts students receiving scholarship grants shall not require  
34           any additional fees based on the status of the student as a scholarship grant recipient.  
35           (c)    A nonpublic school enrolling more than 25 students in any grade whose tuition and  
36           fees are paid in whole or in part with a scholarship grant shall provide and retain information on  
37           student test performance in each grade with more than 25 students, as follows:  
38           (1)    Report to the Authority on the aggregate standardized test performance of  
39           eligible students in grades ~~three, eight, and 11.~~ three and higher pursuant to  
40           subdivision (4) of subsection (a) of this section. Aggregate test performance  
41           data reported to the Authority which does not contain personally identifiable  
42           student data shall be a public record under Chapter 132 of the General ~~Statutes.~~  
43           Statutes, and the Authority shall post this data on its website. Test  
44           performance data may be shared with public or private institutions of higher  
45           education located in North Carolina and shall be provided to an independent  
46           research organization selected by the Authority for research purposes as  
47           permitted by the Federal Education Rights and Privacy Act, 20 U.S.C. §  
48           1232g.  
49           (2)    Retain standardized test performance data for eligible students in all other  
50           grades and annually certify to the Authority compliance with the requirements  
51           of subdivision (4) of subsection (a) of this section.

(c1) A nonpublic school shall not discriminate with respect to the categories listed in 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, as that statute read on January 1, ~~2014~~2014, or on the basis of disability, as defined in the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. § 12102, as that statute read on January 1, 2024.

(e) If a nonpublic school terminates operation during the school's regular schedule and fails to (i) report the date of the closure to the Division within 14 days and (ii) return funds owed to the Authority in a timely manner for students who received scholarship grants, any other nonpublic school opened during that school year or subsequent school years by an owner or chief administrator listed in the report submitted to the Division under ~~subdivision (7)~~subdivision (8) of subsection (a) of this section for that closed school shall be ineligible to receive scholarship grants until such time the Authority determines the obligation to return those funds has been satisfied."

**SECTION 1.(f)** G.S. 115C-562.7, as amended by Sections 7.82 and 8A.6 of S.L. 2023-134, reads as rewritten:

**"§ 115C-562.7. Reporting requirements.**

(b) The Authority shall report annually, no later than October 15, to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the following information from the prior school year:

- (1) Total number, grade level, race, ethnicity, and sex of eligible students receiving scholarship grants.
- (2) Total amount of scholarship grant funding awarded.
- ...
- (4) Nonpublic schools in which scholarship grant recipients are enrolled, including numbers of scholarship grant students at each nonpublic school.
- (5) Nonpublic schools deemed ineligible to receive scholarships.
- (6) Compliance with the academic assessments required by G.S. 115C-562.5(a)(4).

(g) No later than September 30 of each year, the Authority, in consultation with the Department of Public Instruction, shall publish on its website school achievement, growth, and performance scores of nonpublic schools accepting more than 25 students in any grade whose tuition and fees are paid in whole or in part with a scholarship grant. The scores shall be calculated pursuant to the methodology provided in G.S. 115C-83.15."

**SECTION 1.(g)** G.S. 115C-562.8, as amended by Section 8A.6 of S.L. 2023-134, reads as rewritten:

**"§ 115C-562.8. The Opportunity Scholarship Grant Fund Reserve.**

~~The General Assembly finds that, due to the critical need in this State to provide opportunity for school choice for North Carolina students, it is imperative that the State provide an increase of funds for 15 years to the Opportunity Scholarship Grant Fund Reserve. Therefore, there~~ There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Reserve the following amounts for each fiscal year to be used for the purposes set forth in this section:

 14 repealed.

15 **SECTION 1.(i)** Section 8A.6 of S.L. 2023-134 is further amended by adding the  
 16 following new subsection to read:

17 "**SECTION 8A.6.(j1)** Notwithstanding any provision of law or the Committee Report  
 18 described in Section 43.2 of this act to the contrary, the three hundred fifty-four million five  
 19 hundred forty thousand dollars (\$354,540,000) in recurring funds appropriated to the Opportunity  
 20 Scholarship Grant Fund Reserve (Reserve) for the 2024-2025 fiscal year shall be reduced by one  
 21 hundred seventy-four million one hundred seventy-one thousand seven hundred twenty-nine  
 22 dollars (\$174,171,729) so that the total recurring appropriation to the Reserve is one hundred  
 23 eighty million three hundred sixty-eight thousand two hundred seventy-one dollars

 26 **PART II. ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES FOR PERSONAL EDUCATION STUDENT**  
 27 **ACCOUNTS**

28 **SECTION 2.(a)** Article 41 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by  
 29 adding the following new section to read:

30 "**§ 115C-593.5. Academic assessments.**

31 (a) A nonpublic school that accepts eligible students receiving scholarship funds shall  
 32 administer, at least once in each school year, all tests required by the State Board of Education  
 33 pursuant to G.S. 115C-174.11(c) for students in grades three through 12 in a local school  
 34 administrative unit.

35 (b) Test performance data for students shall be submitted to the Authority by July 15 of  
 36 each year. The nonpublic school shall retain this data for five years, and the Authority may audit  
 37 the nonpublic school to ensure compliance with the retention requirement. Test performance data  
 38 reported to the Authority or collected by the Authority under this section is not a public record  
 39 under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes, to the extent the data contains personally identifiable  
 40 information.

41 (c) Tests shall be administered to all eligible students enrolled in grades three and higher  
 42 whose tuition and fees are paid in whole or in part with scholarship funds.

43 (d) The Authority shall provide the parent or guardian of an eligible student, whose  
 44 tuition and fees are paid in whole or in part with scholarship funds, an annual written explanation  
 45 of the student's progress, including the student's scores on standardized achievement tests. If an  
 46 eligible student received a written assessment pursuant to G.S. 115C-562.5(a)(3) for a school  
 47 year, the written assessment may be used to meet the requirements of this subsection.

48 (d) Nothing in this section shall prohibit a nonpublic school from administering  
 49 additional tests to its students."

50 **SECTION 2.(b)** G.S. 115C-598 reads as rewritten:

51 "**§ 115C-598. Reporting requirements.**

7 **PART III. EFFECTIVE DATE**

8 **SECTION 3.** Subsection (i) of Section 1 of this section is effective July 1, 2023.

9 Except as otherwise provided, this act becomes effective July 1, 2024, and applies beginning  
10 with the 2024-2025 school year.
